Q & A with the lakeland curling club

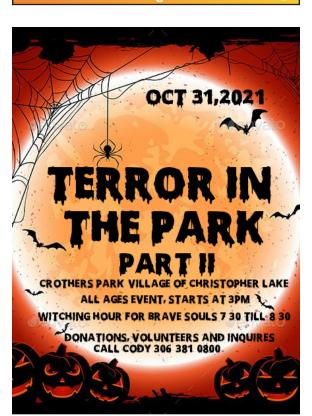

All campgrounds are closed for the season and fall projects are well underway. Park staff have been busy clearing the trails and completing maintenance on facilities. Work will begin in the next few weeks on designated ATV trails within the park, so please take caution when using these areas.

Disc Golf at Murray Point

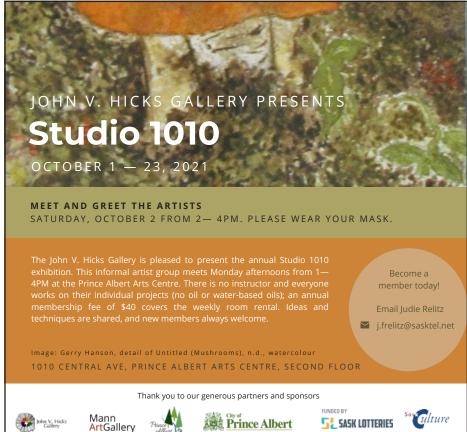
The 9-hole course is open year-round. This course is fun for all ages. Tee boxes, markers and baskets are visible through-out the day use area located north of the boat launch.

outdoor rink update and acknowledgments

For the many community members who believed in Christopher Lake Outdoor Rink Project, thank you for your support and effort throughout the years.

For all the people who bought tickets for trips, flipped burgers, fried fish, etc., thank you.

The Christopher Lake School Student Council, so many have come and gone, but the goal always remained in focus. Thank you for your support and patience to see this project to the end.

Thank you as well to:

- CPL Recreation Directors, Brandy Smart, Trudy MacDowell, Jade Dreaver, Diana Bird, Linda Rogozinski;

- Administrators, Audrey Veer, Jeannie Rip, Dave Dmytruk, Tammy Knuttila;

- Reeves/Mayors, Al Christensen, Cheryl Bauer Hyde, Denis Daughton, Chris McShannock; and - the Lakeland Fire Department for providing the flooding each year.

2011: Sask Rivers School Division requested that the dilapidated outdoor skating structure be removed as it was deemed beyond repair and deemed a safety hazard.

2012 – 2015: Several fundraising events were held - fish fry, cross country ski challenge; and donations were provided to re-build, with approximately \$18,000 raised. The Village of Christopher Lake Council supported revitalizing the outdoor rink project, however fundraising efforts showed such small returns that interest and volunteerism soon plummeted.

2018 - 2020: The Christopher Lake School Community Council (SCC) was looking for an "EASY" project to help enhance the community and initiated two Trip of the

Month raffles. The first raffle realized about \$56,000, however the second raffle resulted in a small loss. Affinity Credit Union provided a grant of \$10,000, and the SCC contributed an additional \$5,200 from other fundraisers.

The CPL Recreation Committee asked CPL Director to assist the SCC to review progress of the Outdoor Rink Project and advise next steps. At a meeting in April 2019, CPL Recreation Director recommended that a business plan be developed. SCC members consisted of Dejan Letkeman (Principal), Amber Johnson, Carmen Dogniez, Shannon Schlamp, and Tara Quick. A "Draft Business Plan" was developed just as the second Trip of the Month raffle finished selling tickets. It was realized that without any visible signs of progress on the rink, the community was losing trust and belief in the project.

That being said, the SSC had raised approximately \$82,000 which was enough to purchase the rink boards, but not enough to pave the surface. Randy and Mike Hurd (Sask Rivers School District) estimated the dimensions for the play surface, and Dash Boards were purchased in September 2019.

Without sufficient funds to complete the rink, the waiting began watching the dream slip by with frustrated community members. The Christopher Lake SCC and CPL Recreation wondered; what can be done now?

Then the Government of Canada announced the Canadian Infrastructure Funding. The criteria for this funding is to support a project that would stimulate workforce in the community due the shutdown from COVID-19. Perfect timing, CPL Recreation approached the Village of Christopher Lake to partner or apply for this funding. This was likely our last hope to finish the project. Many months of waiting and wondering were ahead.

In October 2020, the Federal Government announced that the application from the Village of Christopher Lake had made it to the detailed call for proposal. In-depth budgets, First Nations and Metis Land Use agreements, and support letters were only a few of the many documents that needed to be revised.

With support from the Christopher Lake Council and Administrator, the second stage planning began. Land location, drawings, tweak, tweak, tweak. Tenders went out for the various work, and the Village was given the go ahead. While some components are a work in progress, the rink surface and boards are in place together with the lighting which was installed a few years ago. Community input will be sought to begin planning for activities such as skating, summertime basketball, etc.

We know that some names and events will be missed in this write up. In recounting the history of this project, complete information is hard to locate. But even if your contribution was missed in this narrative, you know you were important to this project and should feel proud when you look at what WE, our COMMUNITY has accomplished together.

Local projects cannot be successful if we don't have the support of community members. Thanks for all your support of the Christopher Lake Outdoor Rink Project!

PMUY

Trailblazing oatmeal cookies chock-full of sweet, savory, crunchy, and chewy ingredients.

YIELD Makes about 40 (3-inch) cookies

INGREDIENTS

2 1/2 cups old-fashioned rolled oats, divided

11/2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

3/4 teaspoon fine salt

1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, at room temperature

3/4 cup packed light or dark brown sugar

3/4 cup granulated sugar

2 large eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 (1.69-ounce) pack M&M chocolate candies (1/4 cup)

1/2 cup coarsely chopped crunchy pretzels (optional)

1/2 cup dried cranberries or raisins

1/2 cup roated peanuts or chopped nuts

1/3 cup chocolate chips

INSTRUCTIONS

Arrange 2 racks to divide the oven into thirds and heat to 350°F. Line 2 sheets with parchment paper or silicone baking mats; set aside.

Place 1 cup of the oats in a food processor fitted with the blade, high-speed blender, or spice grinder. Process until the oats are finely ground. Transfer to a large bowl. Add the remaining 1 1/2 cups whole oats, all-purpose flour, baking powder, and salt and whisk to combine; set aside.

Place the butter, brown sugar, and granulated sugar in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment. (Alternatively, use an electric hand mixer and large bowl.) Beat on medium speed until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes.

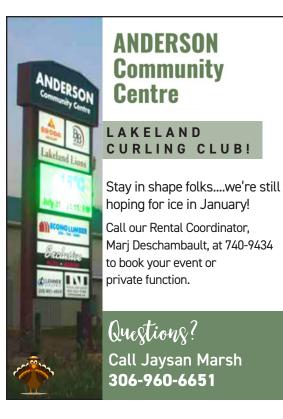
Beat in the eggs one at a time and beat thoroughly after each addition, scraping down the sides of the bowl if needed. Beat in the vanilla. With the mixer on low speed, slowly add the flour mixture and beat until just incorporated.

Remove the bowl from the mixer. Add the M&Ms, pretzels if using, cranberries, peanuts, and chocolate chips and mix into the dough by hand with a rubber spatula until evenly distributed throughout. Scoop 1-ounce (2-tablespoon) mounds of dough onto the baking sheets, spacing them about 2 inches apart, 12 per sheet.

Bake for 9 minutes. Rotate the baking sheets between racks and from front to back halfway through. Bake until the cookies are light goldenbrown on the bottoms and around the edges, 8 to 9 minutes more.

Place the baking sheets on wire racks and cool 3 minutes. Use a flat spatula to transfer the cookies to a wire rack to cool completely. Let the baking sheets cool completely and bake any remaining dough (you can reuse the parchment paper).

healthy duck soup

Diana Bird is an Indigenous Food Sovereigntist. She has her Psychology degree, her Indigenous Social Work Degree and is going for her Masters Degree. She works at the First Nations University and is the proud momma to Gabrielle.



1 wild duck (or domestic)

3 cups of cooked wild rice

1 diced onion

1 cup sliced brown or white button mushrooms

2 diced carrots

2 sliced celery

2 minced garlic cloves

1 cup of dried white beans (soak overnight or used canned)

2 cups of soup mix (barley, yellow split peas, red lentils, black eyed peas).

Saute the veggies for 10 minutes, add the duck and fill the pot with water and the soup mix. Bring to a boil for 10 minutes and simmer for as long as it takes for the beans to cook. 1- 1 1/2 hours.

Take the cooked duck out and take the meat off the bones. Add back to the pot.

Add the cooked wild rice at the end and serve. The cooked red lentils make the broth rich and creamy instead of using white flour.
