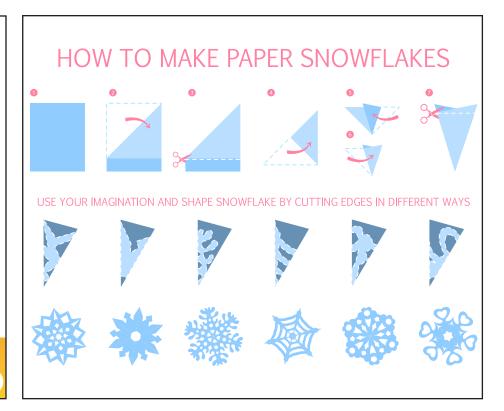
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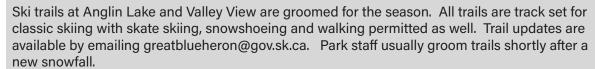

park update

Great Blue Heron Provincial Park



Anglin Lake Trails offer 19 km of groomed ski trails. With rolling hills and beautiful scenery, this area offers a great location for an afternoon or full day of skiing. Parking is located at the Anglin Bridge trailhead. A picnic shelter and fire pit is located at the Anglin bridge and Tower Cabin. Be sure to maintain physical distancing and adhere to provincial Covid-19 restrictions. Unfortunately, the Tower Cabin, warm-up shelters and washrooms will remain closed at this time, due to Covid-19 restrictions.

Spruce River Highlands Trail - located within Prince Albert National Park

Extend your ski by taking the 0.8 km connector trail from Anglin trails into the national park. The south section of this trail is packed with a snowmobile so it makes a great location for snowshoeing or back-country skiing. Trailhead, with parking, is located along Hwy 263.

Valley View Trail is located off Highway 953 between Emma and Anglin Lake. This 5.5 km loop offers a beautiful ski through the mixed wood forest. Maps and signage are located at the trailhead. The warm-up shelter and washrooms are closed at this time due to Covid-19 restrictions.

Murray Point Campground Trail, the 2 km walking trial within the campground has been groomed for cross-country skiing. The trail follows Oliver Creek, then winds through the forest on the south side of the campground coming out along the beach and through the tenting sites, known as Coot's Corner. Access the trail via Bedford Street within Murray Point subdivision and Agnes Street within McIntosh Point. Additional parking is available at Murray Point boat launch. The trail is relatively flat so a great option for beginners or those looking for a quick ski. Walkers and snowshoer's please stay on the edge of the packed trail.

A reminder that a park entry permit is required for any vehicle entering parkland. Daily, annual and senior permits are available at the park office in Christopher Lake.

Candle Lake Festival of Lights starts Dec 18 at Sandy Bay Campground! Celebrate the holidays in a lighted winter wonderland. See save the date for details.

Curling Tip#4

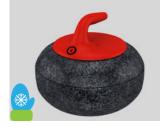
SWEEPING: Some people continue to sweep with a slider on one foot, but we now teach curlers to use two grippers. This is partly for safety in maneuvering around rocks, but it is also for versatility.

Being able to sweep on either side is an asset when playing with others and in affecting the final position of the rock.

To be a good sweeper you must be able to look at the skip or the rock with ease. To do that, the brush handle should be in front of you. If you are on the left side of the rock your left hand is lower than your right. If you are on the right side of the rock your right hand is lower than your left. You need complete control of the brush head at all times so you do not accidentally touch the rock.

The purpose of SWEEPING is to clean the path of the rock. Also, it helps to hold the rock on a straighter trajectory.

SWEEPING with pressure and speed slightly warms the ice allowing the rock to glide farther.











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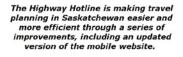

A perfect finger food recipe for the holiday season.

- 1 (7.5 ounce) package refrigerated buttermilk biscuits
- 1/4 cup bacon bits
- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 cup peeled and chopped fresh tomatoes
- 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1. Heat oven to 375 F. Spray 20 wells of 2 miniature muffin pans with cooking spray. Separate biscuits and cut each in half. Press each half into prepared muffin wells.
- 2. In medium bowl, combine bacon bits, onion, tomatoes and cheese. Add mayonnaise and basil. Mix well to combine. Spoon about 1 tablespoon mixture into each biscuit "cup."

Be HERE, NOW, with this BREATH - and this one!

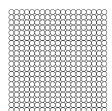

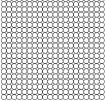

Our government also announced, as part of the Safe Schools Plan, more than \$37.5 million in approved funding for classroom expenses to keep staff and students safe in schools. (This is in addition to the \$51 million in funding that was announced in September.) These are just a few highlights, and I invite you to contact my office for more details. There will be a longer legislative sitting in the spring, when your government will present the 2021-22 provincial budget.

With a renewed mandate following the recent election, I have several new responsibilities and duties which I am pleased to share with you. A noteworthy new role for me is the elected position of Deputy Speaker of the Legislative Assembly. I look forward to fulfilling this mandate, as entrusted to me by my MLA colleagues. I will also serve as Legislative Secretary to the Ministers of Trade and Export Development and Energy and Resources for Forestry, Saskatchewan-Ukraine Relations Liaison, and Deputy Chair of Committees.

Our province's most vulnerable people are in need of care and attention now more than over. Through our collective resilience, let's ensure that our seniors who built this province are protected. We have a duty to ensure that our healthcare system is ready to serve those who need it. Our province is ready to administer the COVID-19 vaccine to healthcare workers and residents of long-term care homes, and we hope to see widespread access to the vaccine by April 2021. While this is very optimistic news, this does not mean we can let our guard down. Continue to follow all public health orders. Wear a mask. Wash your hands. Reduce your bubble and practice social distancing. Thank you for doing your part to reduce the spread of COVID-19.
